DID YOU KNOW?

- A solar eclipse is a lineup of the Sun, the Moon, and Earth
- Everyone in the continental U.S. will see at least a partial eclipse
- First contact of the Total Solar Eclipse is in Oregon
- This eclipse will be the most-viewed ever
 - Marshall is in the 'Path of Totality', (2m39s at 1:10pm)
 - For Missouri, this is the first total solar eclipse since 1869
 - This is the first total solar eclipse to be visible only from the United States since 1776
